



Australian equities rose during the month, led by a sharp rally in resource stocks as commodity prices surged, offset by continued weakness in the technology and financials sectors. Strong gains in gold, copper and bulk commodities supported miners, while higher bond yields and valuation pressure continued to weigh on long-duration growth stocks. Domestically, inflation surprised to the upside at 3.8 per cent and unemployment fell to 4.1 per cent, reinforcing the view that economic conditions remain resilient resulting in a 0.25 per cent Reserve Bank of Australia (RBA) interest rate hike in early February.

The Australian Eagle Equities Fund (the Fund) returned negative 0.23 per cent after fees in January 2026, underperforming the benchmark, as measured by the S&P/ASX 300 Accumulation Index, which rose 1.72 per cent. The market's strength was driven by energy and resources, while continued weakness in technology weighed on portfolio returns. Although the Fund held meaningful exposure to resource companies, these gains were insufficient to offset the sell-off in long-duration growth stocks. The portfolio remains positioned in businesses with improving earnings quality and sustainable competitive advantages, where recent share price weakness reflects sentiment and rate expectations rather than deteriorating fundamentals.

Portfolio changes

The Fund increased positions in ASX Ltd (ASX:ASX), BHP Group Ltd (ASX:BHP), Calix Ltd (ASX:CXL), Evolution Mining Ltd (ASX:EVN), PLS Ltd (ASX:PLS) and Woodside Energy Ltd (ASX:WDS).

The Fund decreased exposure to Life360 Inc. (ASX:360), ARB Corporation Ltd (ASX:ARB), Dexus Ltd (ASX:DXS), Iluka Resources Ltd (ASX:ILU), TechnologyOne Ltd (ASX:TNE) and Xero Ltd (ASX:XRO).

The Fund initiated a small position in WeeBit Nano Ltd (ASX:WBT), a next generation memory licensing company. WeeBit Nano has reached a key commercial inflection point with independent validation of its technology through a licensing contract with a tier one semiconductor partner. WeeBit is now transitioning from a long-dated research and development (R&D) story to a monetisation-driven licensing model with asymmetric upside.

The Fund initiated a position in Worley Ltd (ASX:WOR), a global engineering and project management group across energy, resources and chemicals industries. Recent contract wins and advisory appointments across energy markets have driven backlog growth. This activity materially improves both revenue visibility and mix toward higher-quality reimbursable and advisory work, positioning Worley as a beneficiary of the multi-year global capex cycle.

Contributors

Evolution Mining Ltd (ASX:EVN) continued to outperform as the gold and copper price reset record highs during the month. Management have improved financial year 2026 cost guidance due to strong cost control and higher by-product credits, reinforcing the company's position as one of the lowest cost gold producers.

Woodside Energy Ltd (ASX:WDS) rose with the oil price. Financial year 2025 production exceeded guidance despite seasonal weather impacts in the latest quarter. Beaumont New Ammonia Project achieved first production in late December while growth projects (Scarborough Energy, Trion Project and Louisiana LNG) are all progressing on or ahead of schedule.

ASX Ltd (ASX:ASX) outperformed over the month despite a notable cost growth downgrade, with operating expense growth lifted to 13–15 per cent from a prior 8–11 per cent range. Importantly, the market had not been expecting double-digit revenue growth, which helped offset concerns on costs and reinforced confidence in the underlying operating leverage of the business.

Detractors

Life360 Inc (ASX:360) detracted from performance as the share price fell in line with broader technology sector weakness, despite delivering a strong 4Q25 result. The company exceeded already-upgraded revenue and earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation and amortisation (EBITDA) guidance and reported its strongest ever 4Q monthly active users (MAU) additions.

Xero Ltd (ASX:XRO) fell as the market continued to de-risk positions exposed to higher interest rate uncertainty and scrutinise recent large-scale merger and acquisition (M&A) activity, including concerns around potential overpayment and integration of Melio. The sell-off reflected risk aversion toward longer-dated growth stocks rather than any deterioration in Xero's growing revenue, subscriber numbers and customer retention.

SILEX Systems Ltd (ASX:SLX) underperformed after the company was passed over for the U.S. Department of Energy's US\$900 million uranium enrichment funding round, which disappointed investors expecting a larger near-term catalyst. The company secured a smaller grant to support next-generation laser-based enrichment technology, and the strategic value and long-term commercial potential of its proprietary enrichment technology remains.
